

Artist skills

The children will develop a wide range of art and design techniques in using colour, pattern, texture, line, shape, form and space. They will use drawing and painting to develop and share their ideas and imagination and they will create Make an Elizabethan and Victorian collage using images from the time of Elizabeth I and Victoria.

Geographer skills

The children will learn that the United Kingdom is made up of Northern Ireland, Wales, England and Scotland and the Union Jack is the name of the flag of the United Kingdom. The Union Jack is made from the flags of Scotland, Ireland and England.

Historian skills

Chronological Order

The children will use the skill of placing objects and events in chronological order, in people of different times, identify similarities and differences between ways of life periods.

Knowledge and Understanding of Events, People and Changes in the Past

The children will recognise why Kings, Queens, Prime Ministers and Parliament did things, why significant events happened nationally and globally and what happened as a result. They will also be taught to identify different ways that the past is represented.

Interpretation and Enquiry

The children will use stories to distinguish between fact and fiction, question the reliability of a source and use a variety of resources of information to learn about the past.

Year One Autumn

Core Knowledge

The children will develop an understanding of the role of a Monarch and the current Queen in order to understand the significant impact famous Monarchs that were previously King or Queen had nationally or globally.

England has been ruled by Kings and Queens for many years. Her Royal Highness Queen Elizabeth II is our Queen. Kings and Queens sometimes wear special items such as a crown, and hold special things such as an orb and sceptre.

Embedding Week Opportunities

The children will have the opportunity to go to Warwick Castle. The tour introduces students to the concept of monarchy and discusses key attributes of a successful or unsuccessful monarch, including respect, ability to lead, and producing a suitable heir. The tour includes case studies on William the Conqueror, Henry VIII and Queen Victoria.
